We applaud the efforts of APA members to take a strong stand against participation in military interrogations. And we ask you to go further—to take action in your community and call on Congress to:

- **Shut down Guantanamo, and all other U.S. prisons overseas, including secret CIA detention facilities.**
- **Release all detainees held without charge, which includes most of the prisoners at Guantanamo**
- **Pay compensation to detainees for human rights violations.**
- **Hand over real suspects to the International Criminal Court**
- **Enact new laws unambiguously prohibiting torture and other abuse.**
- **Prosecute those who have committed or ordered such acts.**
- **Stop “extraordinary rendition,” sending “terror suspects” to other countries where we know they will be tortured.**
- **Repeal the Military Commissions Act of 2006, which**
 - strips habeas corpus protections from detainees
 - undermines the Geneva Conventions and makes them unenforceable
 - opens new legal loopholes for torture
 - admits evidence obtained by torture
 - allows the government to declare virtually anyone an "enemy combatant."

A growing movement in the U.S. and around the world is demanding an end to these violations of human rights. (See the other side of this flyer)
